ROYAL AIR FARCE:

All of Britain's Top Gun RAF pilots to be trained in the USA under radical military reform plans - in a move branded 'reckless' by ex-Tory Defence Secretary Gavin Williamson. All RAF pilots are to be trained in the US under radical new plans to reform Britain's military, it was last night claimed. The proposals, which have been branded 'reckless' by ex-Tory Defence Secretary Gavin Williamson, would see recruits train in the US before returning to undergo standard RAF conversion courses. Some 27 RAF pilots are already being trained in America and Italy at a yearly cost of £55million due to problems with the Hawk T2 trainer jets. But military chiefs have warned that shifting all training across the pond would bring 'radical changes', The Express has reported.



Responding to the plans, Mr Williamson said: "You cannot surrender our capability to decide who we will train and in what quantity. Our allies will think we are giving up. If we ever find ourselves in armed conflict, we will be competing for resources with another. We need to have the ability to turn the valve and increase the number of pilots. That won't be possible if we're zooming across the Atlantic with a begging bowl, as Ukraine is forced to do."

Penny Mordaunt, who was appointed Minister of State for the Armed Forces in 2015, described some of the considerations as 'deeply concerning'. She called for the Labour government to provide the Armed Forces with 'stability and sustainability'. (Express)

The plans are being considered as part of Lord George Robertson's 'radical' defence review which will be published in the first half of next year.

The review was launched by Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer in July to reevaluate Britain's defence strategy amid an ongoing manpower crisis and questions over Britain's ability to fight a war. Among the plans being considered is a greater reliance on Britain's NATO partners and a 'complete recalibration' of the British Army. This may see the Army abandon heavy artillery for drones and the closure of several army bases as troops quit, according to The Express's report.

It comes after Chancellor Rachel Reeves handed the Britain's Armed Forces a £2.9billion spending boost in this week's Budget. Some £400 million is expected to be used to hand troops a six per cent pay rise, backdated to April. The forces are currently haemorrhaging experienced personnel and struggle to attract new recruits.

Last week Defence Secretary John Healey questioned whether Britain was currently able to fight a war, in the latest warning about the state of the military.

The funding will also be used to buy weapons, with the aim of replenishing stockpiles depleted by donations to Ukraine. But a pathway to increasing defence spending to 2.5% of national economic output, demanded by the Tories, will not be in the Budget.

The Chancellor instead kicked the decision down the road, saying a date would be set at 'a future fiscal event'.

Mr Healey was praised by his Tory predecessor Ben Wallace, who stood down as an MP at the election.

He said: 'So credit where credit is due for John Healey. He got a one-year defence increase that leaves the door open for 2.5% of GDP in the future.

'In doing so he continues my record of reversing both previous LABOUR and Tories hollowing out over decades.

'The devil will be in the detailed split between revenue funding and capital funding but the increase continues and it is an important signal of a cross-party acceptance that defence needs more money.' A spokesperson for the Ministry of Defence said: 'We won't comment on speculation.

'The Strategic Defence Review will be published in the first half of 2025 and will establish the roles, capabilities and reforms required by UK Defence to meet the challenges, threats and opportunities of the twenty-first century.'

ARE THE HOUTIS WINNING?



Who is winning the battle for the Red Sea? If I were taking bets right now, I'd have some of my money on the Houthis, for they seem to be retaining the initiative. That's based on current results, and one cannot really imagine they will be able to continue preventing over 60 per cent of all shipping from the waterway dividing Africa from Asia.

This month it is one year since the first drone or missile was fired at a merchant ship sailing innocently through the now

infamous Bab al-Mandab Strait. That's the narrow point at the lower end of the Red Sea after which it becomes the Gulf of Aden. This is conveniently close to the Yemen coast from where the Houthis are able to fire off Iranian-supplied missiles and drones almost at will.

Who are these Houthis? The Houthi movement is a Zaydi Shia Islamist militant organisation enjoying the backing of Iran, which by force of arms has wrested control over a large part of Yemen, including the capital of Sanaa and most of the coast facing the Gulf of Aden and the Red Sea.

The result of this year-long naval activity, ostensibly targeting ships with an Israeli interest although making no guarantee that other shipping remains safe, is that the majority of vessels that ordinarily would travel via the Red Sea and Suez Canal, have been forced to sail the much longer route around the Cape of Good Hope. LONDON POPPY DAY:

ZONDERWATER MEMORIAL CONTROVERSY:

Emilio Coccia, well known to many of us and the President of the Zonderwater Block Prisoner of War Association, has happily been exonerated after several years of controversy and allegations initiated by the Italian Consul General, and writes:

"Dear Friends,

Since March 2021, after the arrival of the new Consul General of Italy in 2020, the Zonderwater Block ex POW Association has been forced out of the Italian POW cemetery and an accusation of crime was laid with the Italian judicial authorities in Rome against its president.

After six months of investigation, the Public Prosecutor insisting on indictment against the undersigned, the Preliminary Hearing Judge ruled, on 18 May 2023, "that COCCIA EMILIO, regarding the offence ascribed to him, should not be proceeded against because the fact does not constitute an offence." The Preliminary Judgment was endorsed Final Judgment the 7 September 2023.

Rumours are still being spread that are defaming the character of the undersigned, as happened on the 12 November 2023 at Zonderwater, and thereafter. I attach, for your information, copy of the Final Judgment by the Criminal Court of Rome, trusting that this will assist the interested persons to assess the truth on the matter.

ESKOM'S BIG COAL STATION SHUTDOWN MISTAKE:

Over two years after shutting down its Komati coal power station in Mpumalanga to convert it into a renewable power facility, Eskom has not yet appointed the companies that will be building the plant's new generators.

Komati was supposed to be the first testing ground for Eskom's Just Energy Transition (JET) project, which is aimed at reducing the utility's reliance on fossil fuels like coal power in favour of renewable energy.

A key part of the project's goals is to ensure that this switch does not leave workers and communities behind that rely on Eskom's extensive coal power station fleet for their livelihoods. When Eskom originally announced the shutdown of Komati's last unit in October 2022, it said the site would be getting 150MW of solar, 70MW of wind, and 150MW battery storage.

As of November 2024, not a single megawatt of that capacity has entered construction.

However, Eskom's failure to plan and execute properly on the Komati project threatens its ability to get buy-in from coal-reliant communities on the shift towards clean energy at its other to-be-decommissioned power stations over the next few decades. (My Broadband)

BOTSWANA: DUMA BOKO - THE POLITICIAN WHO DID THE UNTHINKABLE:

Botswana continues to be the exception that proves the rule in SADEC African politics – not least in democratic elections, in contrast to the current chaos on Mozambique...

In a stunning result that ran counter to much of the pre-election analysis and expectations, the Botswana Democratic Party (BDP), which had ruled Botswana since the country's first post-independence election in 1966, lost its parliamentary majority in last Wednesday's elections by a landslide. The long-ruling party won only four of the 61 seats in the National Assembly, down from the 38 it won in the last general election five years ago. The main opposition party, the Umbrella for Democratic Change (UDC), won 32 seats, surpassing the 31 needed to secure a governing majority. Under Botswana's constitution, the majority in parliament elects the president. As a result, the UDC's leader, Duma Boko, has ascended to the presidency, taking the place of the BDP's Mokgweetsi Masisi, who resigned after more than seven years in power.

The election results evince the impressive growth of support in the relatively short history of the UDC, which was formed by a coalition of parties in 2012 to challenge the ruling BDP. In the latest election, the UDC ran in direct opposition to the BDP, arguing that the long-ruling party had repeatedly failed to deliver for the 2.5 million people of Botswana on issues ranging from the economy to healthcare, made worse by allegations of corruption. The handover of power appears to be proceeding smoothly... (Responsible Statecraft)
